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MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT & CEO



Dear Friends:

On behalf of the Colorectal Cancer Resource & Action Network ('CCRAN'), allow me to extend a warm welcome to our inaugural Early Age Onset Colorectal Cancer (EAOCRC) Virtual Symposium. We are delighted to be hosting you all today at our very first official scientific conference.

While we are very pleased to see the incidence of colorectal cancer declining in Canadians over 50 years of age, largely due to population-based screening programs, rates have been sharply increasing in adults younger than 50 years in Canada. Since Canadians younger than 50 years are not within the recommended screening age because they are considered to be at low risk for the disease, this upward trend gives us pause and cause for concern.

In response to the rising rates in young adult colorectal cancer and the growing number of young patients seeking support, education and advocacy for advanced colorectal cancer, CCRAN decided to host the first of 3 symposia dedicated to educating on and strategizing a response to the upward trend in young adult colorectal cancer rates.

CCRAN assembled a stellar expert steering committee to help plan, coordinate and guide the delivery of today's evidencebased presentations. Expert speakers will assist us in better understanding the landscape of ongoing research initiatives accounting for the rising rates in young adults. One of our Symposium objectives is to better support our valued primary care physicians, who are on the front lines every day, seeing patients with a diverse and wide variety of health-related issues. MS. ANA BETTENCOURT Set the stage: Call to action, young adult patient panel



In June 2019, at the age of 46, after suffering from abdominal pains and incessant vomiting, I was taken to the local Emergency Room and was to my surprise diagnosed with colon cancer. I can't tell you the horror and surprise I was feeling when I was delivered that diagnosis. One month later, it was confirmed that my disease was stage IV, with metastatic disease to my liver and peritoneum. How could that be? I was so young. My colon tumour was the size of a large grapefruit, which had been estimated to have developed approximately 10 years ago.

Cancer wasn't new to me. In 1999, I had gone through the Non Hodgkins Lymphoma journey and treated successfully. When I turned 30, I began bi-yearly breast exams because of my health history. But no one ever told me about colorectal cancer. It was never on my radar. Colonoscopies were never added to my screenings. I had no awareness or knowledge of colon cancer. Had I been screened earlier, perhaps my disease could have been caught at an earlier stage and far more manageable and perhaps even curable.

My first line treatment was not successful. I had no response to chemo because my oncologist determined I had a special mutation in my primary tumour: I was MSI-High. This was actually a blessing. It meant I qualified for immunotherapy which I went on to access in second line through a study and my disease responded remarkably well! Within 2 rounds I started feeling better and my scans showed consistent improvements. Five cycles later, I am now under surveillance and doing so well. I am committed to promoting awareness of young adult colorectal cancer to help other Canadians diagnosed with metastatic colorectal cancer.

MR. ANDREW HARE SET THE STAGE: CALL TO ACTION. STAGE IV SURVIVOR TESTIMONIAL

My name is Andrew Hare and I was diagnosed with stage 4 colorectal cancer when I was 29 years old. I experienced symptoms for 2 years before I was finally diagnosed with multiple trips to the doctor during that time. I went through 1 round of radiation, 3 surgeries on either my colon, liver or lungs and 4 courses of chemotherapy during a 4 and a half year period. I have been no evidence of disease for the last 5 years. I was newly married when I was diagnosed and since my surgeries and treatment I have been lucky to have two beautiful energetic young boys. My goal is to bring awareness to the challenges and isolation young people experience when diagnosed with metastatic colorectal cancer.



MS. ARMINA LIGAYA Set the stage: Call to action. Young adult patient panel

I was six months pregnant at a relatively young age when I was first diagnosed with colorectal cancer. My symptoms first believed to be pregnancy-related - turned out to be far more serious. The whirlwind journey of becoming a mother was coupled with a fierce battle fighting this disease, a journey that included radiation, surgery and chemotherapy. I'm extremely lucky to have caught this disease early. Thanks to my doctors, CCRAN, the support of my husband



family and friends, I am happy to say I am heathy and my daughter is thriving. I hope to raise awareness of this disease to help others avoid having to go through the same ordeal that I experienced.



MR. BILL MCGINLEY

SET THE STAGE: CALL TO ACTION, YOUNG ADULT PATIENT PANEL

My name is William (Bill) McGinley. I was originally diagnosed with Stage 3 colorectal cancer, 13 years ago, at age 40. I was very fortunate that after a year of treatment, comprising of a month of radiation, followed by surgery and then adjuvant chemotherapy, I was No Evidence of Disease (NED) for 10 years. Unfortunately, in January 2018, ten years later, as a result of routine annual testing, I discovered that my cancer had returned, this time as stage 4, with metastases in my lungs and my

retroperitoneum, for which I am currently being treated with chemotherapy. I am happily married to a beautiful woman named Kim, who I cherish, and I am the proud father of four wonderful Kids, Kaeleigh, Alleigh, Rowyn, and Ryleigh, all blessings, who keep me on the straight and narrow! As Chair of the Patient Advisory Council, I am passionate about fundraising for CCRAN, to ensure its legacy, as well as the psychosocial support patients and caregivers receive from CCRAN and offer to each other in monthly group sessions. I hope you will get a lot out of the Early Age Onset Colorectal Cancer Virtual Symposium. We all owe it to ourselves and other Canadians to promote education in respect of young adult colorectal cancer.

MS. ANDREA DWYER THE IMPETUS FOR CHANGE IN THE U.S., UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO CANCER CENTRE & EIGHT COLORECTAL CANCER

Ms. Andrea (Andi) Dwyer is the Director and a founding member of the Colorado Cancer Screening Program (CCSP) at the University of Colorado Cancer Center largely focused on colorectal cancer. CCSP is now growing the prevention and cancer control work to hereditary and lung cancer screening initiatives. As a co-chair of the National Colorectal Roundtable Evidence Based Health Promotion subcommittee and former member of executive committee member of the National Colorectal Roundtable, she has



extensive partnerships at the state and national level for health promotion activities and partnerships in colorectal cancer. At the state level, Ms. Dwyer is on the Executive Committee of the Colorado Community Health Worker (CHW) and Patient Navigation (PN) Collaborative to help advance this work in Colorado and Chair of the Colorado Cancer Coalition. On the national front, Andrea is the Vice Chair of the Patient Navigation Roundtable, supported by the American Cancer Society. Ms. Dwyer also advises Fight Colorectal, a national colorectal survivorship nonprofit, in their health promotion and research aims for the growing number of colorectal cancer survivors and advocates to bridge the public health, research and medical care for better programs.

She is actively engaged in education and research, with over 100 peer-reviewed publications and book chapters to her credit. Dr. Petra Wildgoose is a family physician with a special designation in oncology. She also has specific interests in both mental health and the care of young adults. She received her certification in family medicine from the Department of Family and Community Medicine at the University of Toronto in 2018. DR. CLARENCE WONG

THE CASE FOR EARLY DETECTION, INTERIM SECTION CHIEF, GASTROENTEROLGY, EDMONTON, AHS

Dr. Wong is a gastroenterologist and Associate Professor with the Division of Gastroenterology at the University of Alberta. He is an Attending Staff gastroenterologist at the Royal Alexandra Hospital, University of Alberta Hospital and the Cross Cancer Institute. He holds a BSc in Cellular and Molecular Biology from the University of Calgary and a MD degree from the University of Alberta. He is the medical director of the Edmonton Endoscopic Ablation Program which treats Barrett's esophagus and early upper gastrointestinal



tract cancers. Previously, he served as the Medical Lead for the SCOPE Colon Cancer Screening Program in Edmonton, and then the Alberta Colorectal Cancer Screening Program. He is currently the Section Chief for Gastroenterology in the Edmonton Zone for Alberta Health Services. His research interests include clinical and laboratory innovations in colon cancer screening and Barrett's esophagus. He has received regional and national teaching awards for excellence in medical education and is recognized by the American and Canadian Associations of Gastroenterology with honorary fellowships for superior and distinguished service to the field of gastroenterology.

MARY DE VERA, PhD

STEERING COMMITTEE, ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR, UNIVERSITY OF BRITISH COLUMBIA



Dr. De Vera is an Associate Professor at the University of British Columbia's Faculty of Pharmaceutical Sciences where she holds a Tier 2 Canada Research Chair. She holds a Bachelors degree in Biochemistry and Masters and Doctoral degrees in Health Care and Epidemiology. An epidemiologist and health services researcher her research program spans pragmatic studies in real-world settings and population-based studies using administrative databases to study patient experiences with disease and treatments, particularly in rheumatology and oncology. She brings the patient perspective to her research with her own experiences of being diagnosed with young-onset colorectal cancer in 2016 at the age of 36.

MARY JANE ESPLEN, PhD

STEERING COMMITTEE, VICE-CHAIR, DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHIATRY, UNIVERSITY OF TORONTO

Dr. Mary Jane Esplen is Professor and Vice-Chair, Department of Psychiatry, Temerty Faculty of Medicine, University of Toronto, former Clinician-Scientist at University Health Network and founded de Souza Institute – a National Centre of education for oncology health professionals. She has held Career Scientist awards from CIHR and NCIC for psychosocial oncology research, completing studies of psychotherapeutic treatments to support adjustment to being diagnosed with cancer



or receiving genetic risk information in breast, colorectal or pancreatic cancer. Other areas of research include studies addressing body image among cancer survivors or the management of grief and loss. Dr. Esplen gives numerous workshops and keynotes and has received several awards, including the lifetime achievement award from Canadian Association Psychosocial Oncology and the Bernard Fox Memorial Award from International Psycho-oncology Society.

MS. ROSLYN (ROZ) FITZPATRICK

STEERING COMMITTEE, COLORECTAL CANCER SURVIVOR

Roz is a Lynch Syndrome (HNPCC) patient and colorectal cancer survivor, diagnosed at age 42. She is the proband in her family dealing with the diagnoses of Lynch Syndrome, which is reported to affect 8% of all under age 50 colorectal cancer patients. Roz brings to light the importance of the role of a family proband; to help family members in a large pedigree undergo molecular genetic testing, surveillance and management, given the intricacies of Lynch syndrome in order to save lives. She has spent much of the last 19 years since her own



colorectal cancer and Lynch diagnosis raising awareness and educating the public on both topics. Although she has no formal medical training, she has researched and collaborated with geneticists and other medical professionals worldwide and has coauthored an article in an international medical journal. Roz is very grateful to be part of this steering committee to highlight the importance of raising awareness and educating family physicians on Lynch Syndrome (HNPCC) and the implications of looking beyond the patient to the family as a whole, to reduce the incidence of early age onset colorectal cancer, due to this drastically underdiagnosed syndrome that affects 1 in 279 people.

DR. CHRISTOPHER LIEU

STEERING COMMITTEE, CO-DIRECTOR OF GI MEDICAL ONCOLOGY, THE UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO CANCER CENTER



Dr. Lieu joined the University of Colorado School of Medicine faculty in 2011. He trained in internal medicine at the University of Colorado, where he also served as a Chief Medical Resident. Dr. Lieu completed his fellowship training in medical oncology at the University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center and served as the Chief Medical Oncology Fellow in 2010. Dr. Lieu currently serves as the co-Director of GI Medical Oncology at the University of Colorado Cancer Center, the Vice-Chair of the National Cancer Institute Colon Cancer Task Force, the FDA Oncologic Drugs Advisory Committee (ODAC), and the National Comprehensive Cancer Network (NCCN) Panel for Neuroendocrine Cancers.

Dr. Dan Schiller is a Surgical Oncologist working at the Royal Alexandra Hospital and an Associate Professor with the Department of Surgery at the University of Alberta. After completing an undergraduate Bachelor of Engineering degree in Computer Engineering at the University of Ottawa in 1992 he obtained his Doctor of Medicine from the University of Western Ontario in 1996. 


Susan Turner is President of Turner & Associates Inc., founded in 2004 to help organizations address health policy issues in the areas of cancer and Indigenous health.
